

COMMUNITY AND JUSTICE SERVICES (CJSP)

Ontario College Diploma | 4 semesters | Barrydowne

If you're passionate about law and justice and want to help at-risk and high-risk client groups in both community and institutional settings, the Community and Justice Services program is your path to an exciting career. This program blends corrections theory with practical experiences building your skills and confidence.

Every semester we bring you to the field or the field experts to you with numerous guest speakers currently employed in the field who will share their tips, stories, and an outstanding breadth of knowledge. Our experienced and dedicated faculty are practiced in experiential, applied, service, and student as partner learning.

You will acquire public safety skills and learn to secure staff and clients in institutional, residential, community correction and group home settings. You will learn how to help clients across the continuum of the justice system with an emphasis on corrections, intervention in a trauma informed lens, and reintegration. You will train in the legal aspects of crime and behaviour, security measures and techniques including interviewing and intervention skills for young offenders, adult offenders and victims. You will identify and examine issues of diversity and inclusivity related to unique populations in community and justice services and corrections. Understand issues related to female and Indigenous offenders, addiction, group dynamics, behaviour management and victims within the criminal justice system.

The Justice Scenario room at Cambrian College is a unique learning space where faculty will involve students in simulations to hone skills and test competencies in a realistic setting using state of the art technology such as body cams and CCTV pan and tilts cameras to mimic the field. Our concentrated focus on practical application includes:

- therapeutic intervention and security
- communication and rapport building
- de-escalation and conflict resolution
- program development and facilitation
- report writing and case management

Your college experience is capped off with a 10-week, 350-hour field placement follow by specialized professional development training in self-defense, suicide intervention, and interprofessional collaborative practices.

Program Highlights

- 2 years – 4 semesters
- 10-week placement (350 hours)
- Tours of a youth centre, a federal minimum and medium security penitentiary, and a provincial jail (vulnerable sectors police clearance is required).
- Hands-on training in safety and security, motivational interviewing, observation, and reporting writing in the College's scenario room that features three cells and updated technology to practice your skills in a realistic environment.

- Guest experts include from federal, provincial, and community justice services, victim services and advocacy agencies
- Faculty with over 30+ years of field experience in federal and provincial adult corrections and youth justice
- Students exit the program with a solid, practical understanding of criminal and social justice issues in Canada, as well as the academic skills of analytical reasoning, critical thinking, and solid interpersonal communication skills.
- Specialized training within emerging issues and certification for:
 - Self-defense training
 - Non-violent crisis intervention (NVCPI)
 - Suicide Alertness (safeTALK)
 - Suicide intervention (ASIST)
 - Mental Health First Aid
 - Interprofessional Collaborative Practices

Fieldwork/Placement

This program includes a 10-week placement experience in the final semester where students are involved in an unpaid fieldwork experience for 350 hours. Where possible, the location of placement will correspond to the student's preferred choice of vocation. Field placement is restricted to students who have successfully completed or are completing all required courses.

4D Learning Opportunities

Cecil Facer Volleyball Recreation Nights - Students model professionalism and teamwork, practice rapport building, setting professional boundaries and maintaining confidentiality through their participation in weekly recreation nights of volleyball with young persons in conflict with the law that are serving their sentence at Cecil Facer Youth Centre. No requirement that you are skilled in volleyball, must bring positive energy, and a willingness to participate and challenge yourself. This long standing partnership gives students 4D experience beginning in your first semester and carrying throughout your time in the program. To be eligible to be involved students need a Criminal Records Check - Vulnerable Services Sector.

Additional Requirements

Graduates of Police Foundations Programs are eligible to complete the program in a compressed schedule using transferable credits. Students can successfully meet the requirements within one year while still gaining a placement experience of 260-280 hours. Please consult The Enrolment Centre for the exact tuition fees for this option as it can result in additional fees.

All students are required to produce a criminal records check for vulnerable sectors to attend institutional tours and participate in select volunteer experiences. It is strongly recommended that students obtain this prior to registration. An additional criminal reference check is required for fourth semester placement where some placements will require an enhanced criminal records check that may take between six to eight weeks. Placements may also require Standard First Aid, CPR Level C and/or proof of immunization.

Admission Requirements

For graduates of the new curriculum (OSS): Ontario Secondary School Diploma (30 credits) or equivalent or mature student status, including:

- Any grade 12 English (C) or (U)

Recommended:

- Any law class
- Computer competency in relevant software

Additional Requirements

Graduates of Police Foundations and Protection, Security and Investigations programs are eligible to complete the program in a compressed schedule using transferable credits. Students can successfully meet the requirements within one year while still gaining a placement experience of 280 hours. It is recommended you consult the Program Coordinator before applying to confirm the courses for this specialized stream of study. Additional tuition fees may apply.

Employment Opportunities

Graduates are prepared for employment opportunities in:

- Federal and provincial correctional institutions
- Open and secure custody settings for youth
- Residences for adult offenders (halfway houses, treatment centres)
- Residences for youth who are in conflict with the law (group homes)
- Federal and provincial government ministries – Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services, Corrections Services Canada, the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services
- Private and non-profit community organizations (NGO's)

- Graduates may also work with people who are at risk of being in conflict with the law and in community-based justice services and/or victim-oriented programs.
- Police Forces including Military Police

College/University Degree Opportunities

Graduates from this program may continue their studies at college/university and may receive credit for their prior College education.
